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# What is CARE?

Cooperative Agencies Resources for Education (CARE) is a state funded program developed in 1977 by Blanche Goldstein. The CARE program is a supplemental program of the Extended Opportunity Programs & Services (EOPS) that provides additional supportive services and activities to eligible single parents receiving CalWORKs/TANF funds (cash aid) as income assistance.

## How can CARE help me

The CARE program provides supportive services that will help you to enroll in college and maintain satisfactory academic performance throughout your EOPS/CARE eligibility by offering services that enrich your needs.

These services are intended to be "over and above" those you receive from EOPS or other college and community-based agencies.

# How do I qualify for CARE

# You must be eligible for EOPS and meet all the following criteria:

- Apply for EOPS and granted enrollment,
- Be 18 years or older,
- Have unmet need (this is determined by your FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid)),
- Be an active CalWORKs/TANF/Tribal TANF (cash aid) recipient,
- Be a single parent head-of-household parent w/ at least one child under 18 years of age, and
- Must be enrolled in at least 12 units at MSJC (unless providing a waiver through EOPS or ACS)

<sup>\*</sup>All services are based on available funding and the student's unmet financial need.

# Student Responsibility

To maintain good academic standing with the CARE program, students must be an active EOPS student and fulfill their responsibilities as outlined by the <u>Mutual Responsibility Contract (MRC)</u> and <u>Student Policy Statement (SPS)</u> each semester.

**Note:** Mutual Responsibility Contracts will be evaluated throughout the semester. If a student is no longer eligible for EOPS, the student is no longer eligible for CARE services.

### **New CARE Students**

### **Must** fulfil the following:

- Complete CARE orientation
- Complete an intake with the CARE Coordinator or designated staff
- Complete the Agency Certification form
- Complete the Child Care Verification form
- Complete required workshops to be eligible for Child Care Grants and Meal Cards
- Comply with EOPS Mutual Responsibility Contract

# **Continuing CARE Students**

### Must fulfil the following per semester:

- Complete and submit the NEW Agency Certification form
- Complete and submit the NEW Child Care Verification form
- Complete required workshops to be eligible for Child Care Grants and Meal Cards
- Comply with EOPS Mutual Responsibility Contract

### Mandatory CARE documents

CARE program eligibility will be determined by submission of the CARE Agency Verification form and Child Care Verification form, per semester.

#### Agency Verification Form

Students will complete the top portion of the document and provide a copy to your Department of Public Social Services Eligibility Worker or Gain Counselor. The County DPSS (Department of Public Social Services) designated staff will complete the middle and bottom sections of the form.

- 1. Before submitting the CARE Agency Verification Form to the CARE program, students must review and confirm the following:
  - Questions 1-7 have been completed.
  - The County DPSS representative has printed their name, including the title/position, signed, dated, and the phone number is included; and
  - County DPSS office has stamped the form where designate
- 2. Completed forms may be uploaded to e-Document Submissions: Secure Document Upload.

### Childcare Verification Form

Student and Childcare provider must complete the Childcare Verification form.

#### Form submission:

- Complete all sections of the Childcare verification form, filled out, signed, and dated
- Completed forms may be uploaded through e-Document Submissions: Secure Document Upload.

### **CARE Mandatory Contacts**

CARE counseling contacts focus on students' progress every semester. Contacts serve as "check-ins," and students are encouraged to complete (3) contacts each semester. All contacts must be completed on the designated dates.

Students schedule appointments HERE.

Intervention 4<sup>th</sup> contacts are required if any of the following occur:

- Students miss contacts without notifying EOPS/CARE program
- Students are "Late or No show" (10 or more minutes) for two or more contacts
- Students complete contact after the designated deadlines (see below for deadlines)

Tip: Set appointment reminders on your mobile device and calendars.

4th Contact - Intervention - January 16th to May 22nd

1st Contact - June 3rd to July 25th

# **CARE Benefits & Services**

Eligible CARE students will receive an emailed transmittal schedule outlining workshop due dates and grant disbursement dates.

NOTE: All financial supportive services are based on state funding and are subject to change\*

CARE reserves the right to cancel grant disbursements, gas card, and meal card distribution for noncompliance, such as unsatisfactory academic progress, failure to turn in required documentation,
nonpayment to childcare providers, or not completing (3) mandatory contacts per semester.

### CARE grants are awarded based upon the following criteria per semester:

- Financial unmet need
- Completion and submission of CARE (5 total) workshops and workshop verification forms.
- (3) CARE counseling contacts

### Child Care Grants\*

The CARE Childcare grant is a supplemental grant to help students pay for childcare services during class, lab, and/or study time. The State of California requires that students seek other means of childcare before applying for a CARE grant.

### How are Childcare grants awarded?

Upon completion and submission of the Childcare Verification form & (5) Workshop Verification forms our CARE team will review documents and determine eligibility. Once approved, students will receive emailed notification of the grant amount and disbursement date.

**NOTE:** Childcare grants will be disbursed through Financial Aid. It is the CARE student's responsibility to pay Childcare providers directly.

### Is the Childcare grant considered Income?

No, CARE grants are not considered income. The CARE grant is State funding awarded to undergraduate students for educational purposes to help pay childcare expenses. Grants are adjusted in your financial aid budget to prevent over awarding.

### Book Grant \*

The Book Grant provides students with a preset dollar amount to help offset the cost of the student's required textbooks for enrolled courses per semester.

### **Book Grant Eligibility:**

- Student utilized entire EOPS book grant
- Student is a current CARE student
- Student has financial unmet need

### **Book Grant Request & Processing:**

Students submit a <u>Textbook Voucher Increase or Reimbursement Request.</u> If funding is available and a book grant is approved, students will receive an email notification with instructions for retrieving course materials. Please allow (14) fourteen business days from the date of submission to process your request.

### Gas and Meal Card\*

Students must have a financial unmet need and complete required workshops to be eligible for gas and meal cards each semester.

### Gas and Meal Card Request & Processing

Students complete:

- Complete (3) required workshops by the designated due dates
- Complete <u>Workshop Verification</u> form **and** workshop participation confirmation (email notification from workshop facilitator) for each completed workshop
- Upload workshop verification documentation to the <u>Secure Document Upload</u> for EOPS/CARE Please allow (14) fourteen business days from the date of submission to process your request.

## Requesting Course Supplies\*

Required course supplies must be listed on the student's course syllabus. Students may submit a request for CARE to purchase course supplies up to \$200.00.

# Course Supply Request & Processing

Student provide the following:

- Completed Required Course Material Request form
- Copy of MSJC Student ID or CA ID/DL (Photocopies accepted)
- Copy of the course syllabus outlining required course name, course section #, instructor name, course item
- Upload documentation to the Secure Document Upload for EOPS/CARE

If funding is available and course supplies are approved, students will receive an email notification with instructions for retrieving course materials. Please allow (14) fourteen business days from the date of submission to process your request.
