A MESSAGE FROM THE COLLEGE SUPERINTENDENT/PRESIDENT

Mt. San Jacinto College experienced an academic year unlike any other in its nearly 60-year history due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Our students, faculty and staff proved how resilient they could be in the face of such adversity and uncertainty. I am truly proud of how much we accomplished.

More students graduated and earned more degrees and certificates from MSJC in May 2021 than ever in our history.

We expanded the MSJC Promise program, which removes a major financial barrier to attending college by providing first-time, full-time students with free tuition.

We continued examining our curriculum and practices to ensure we end systemic racism at MSJC and reduce the opportunity gaps for our African American and Black students and other marginalized populations.

Despite working and teaching remotely, we remained connected to our students and community. We continued to offer our students virtual services, events and workshops, and rallied to provide our community with in-person support such as COVID-19 vaccine and testing clinics. We teamed with the County of Riverside to hand out masks at our Menifee Valley Campus. We continued to offer our students food through our Food 4 Thought pantry.

We ranked on Hispanic Outlook Magazine's Top 25 list as one of the top community colleges in the nation for Hispanic students. We earned "Military Friendly" designations for our dedication to our veteran students and families.

We opened our new Temecula Valley Campus, the first permanent campus of higher education serving Riverside County's southwest region.

Over the next year, we'll debut a portion of our new Kinesiology and Athletics Complex at the Menifee Valley Campus that will feature our stadium, softball field, beach volleyball courts, and classrooms.

At both the San Jacinto and Menifee Valley Campuses, we're preparing to break ground on new Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) buildings. At the San Jacinto Campus, we're partnering with Garner Holt Education Through Imagination to build an Animatronic Makerspace.

As you can see, we're not letting a pandemic stand in the way of progress at MSJC, where our students come first.

We can continue to support our students' dreams by working together. We urge you to donate, volunteer or advocate on behalf of our students through the MSJC Foundation. Your generosity will help ensure our students succeed.

The Mt. San Jacinto Community College District was formed in 1960 by a vote of the citizens in Banning, Beaumont, Hemet and San Jacinto. The first students attended MSJC in Fall 1963. The San Jacinto Campus opened on former farmland in 1965. The Temecula, Lake Elsinore, Perris and adjacent areas voted in 1975 to join the district, increasing the college's area to the present 1,700 square miles. MSJC serves students on four sites in Menifee, San Jacinto, Temecula and the San Geronimo Pass.

MISSION

The MSJC Foundation's mission is to promote student success by enhancing the quality of higher education throughout the district. The Foundation was formed to receive gifts for the college from individuals, corporations, community alliances, and foundations and to provide scholarships, mini-grants, and direct funding to enhance MSJC's services and programs.



CONSTRUCTION BEGINS ON KINESIOLOGY AND ATHLETICS COMPLEX AT MVC

MSJC broke ground on its \$41 million Kinesiology and Athletics Complex at the Menifee Valley Campus on March 23. The project, which is expected to debut in Fall 2022, will feature a 5,000-seat stadium and field house, softball field, and sand volleyball courts.

The college district's 2014 voter-approved Measure AA, a \$295 million facilities bond, is funding the construction of the stadium, which will also include large classrooms, faculty offices, fitness/weight rooms, lockers, team rooms and a press box.

Measure AA also financed the purchase and renovation of the Temecula Valley Campus that opened to students in Fall 2021; funded renovations of a Menifee Valley Campus building into a new Student Center; is financing -- along with matching state funds -- the construction of Science Technology Engineering and Math (STEM) buildings at the San Jacinto and Menifee Valley campuses in the next few years; and funded other improvements at each of the district's four campus locations.

MSJC LAUNCHES LOGO AND BRAND REFRESH

MSJC updated its branding and logos for the college and athletics during the spring.

“MSJC needed to build a stronger visual identity, establish brand consistency across the college district, and meet new industry standards resulting from the rapid changes in technology and tools,” said Karin Marriott, director of Public Information, Marketing & Strategic Communications, who led the branding refresh project.

The refreshed logos were reviewed and supported by the college’s Classified Senate, Academic Senate and the Student Government Association, Athletics, and Administration. They were approved by the MSJC Board of Trustees in March.

MSJC continued to support the region during the COVID-19 pandemic by offering vaccines and testing through its Student Health Centers at the Menifee Valley and San Jacinto campuses.

The college also hosted a mask giveaway at the Menifee Valley Campus on Aug. 26, 2020, as part of Riverside County’s Masks Are Medicine campaign to hand out 10 million masks in a month.

“We’re happy to partner with the county to provide a location for residents to pick up masks to assist in stopping the spread of COVID-19,” said Beth Gomez, vice president of Business Services at MSJC.

highly competitive scholarship, which provides students with up to \$40,000 a year to complete their bachelor's degrees. The Political Science and Liberal Arts-Social & Behavioral Sciences double major transferred to UC Berkeley.

Enrique Baranda, a 4.0 GPA Honors Student and Phi Theta Kappa (PTK) member, earned the PTK Distinguished Chapter Officer Award. 
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MSJC Celebrates Record-Breaking Graduation

COMMENCEMENT

In a year when the COVID-19 pandemic forced MSJC to serve nearly all its students online for classes and services, the college still celebrated a record-breaking graduation in May 2021. MSJC awarded a record-breaking 3,848 degrees and certificates to 2,173 graduates. That marked 215 more graduates than in 2020, when the previous record was set.

MSJC held two drive-through graduation celebrations – one for the Class of 2021 and another for the Class of 2020, which had been provided a virtual event due to COVID-19. The college also provided the Class of 2021 a virtual commencement for students and their families and friends.



NURSE PINNING CEREMONIES RECOGNIZE MORE THAN 50 STUDENTS

More than 50 MSJC students earned their Associate of Science in Nursing degrees during the academic year, culminating in two virtual nurse pinning ceremonies in which graduates eagerly celebrated with their loved ones.



“Earning a nursing degree is a huge accomplishment by itself, but doing so during this pandemic is amazing,” said Dr. Peter Zografos, MSJC Nursing Program Director. “They’re resilient. It’s a testament to the graduates’ willpower and motivation. They’re going to do wonderful things for our communities.”

DOZENS OF STUDENTS EARN THEIR GEDs

More than 70 students of varying ages earned their GEDs at MSJC over the past year. Two virtual ceremonies recognized their accomplishments. Many of the students transition into career certificate or associate degree programs at the college.

THE SHOW STILL GOES ON FOR THEATER STUDENTS





ATHLETICS OPTS IN FOR SPRING II SPORTS

The COVID-19 pandemic forced several sports to abruptly end their seasons with no certainty as to when they would return.

In late February 2021, MSJC announced the exciting news the college would opt in for the "Spring II" athletics season that began in April and featured baseball, men's and women's tennis, and men's golf. "The pandemic forced them to miss their 2020 season and the thought of them missing a second season motivated the MSJC team to work toward a timely and, most importantly, safe return to competition."



MEN'S GOLF STAYS THE COURSE

Eagles men's golf played the closest to a "regular" season as the Orange Empire Conference set a nearly complete conference schedule with just three of the league's 10 teams opting out. Jonathan Huerta and Micah Stewart led the way for the team with scoring averages under 80 for the year in 11 events.



TENNIS TEAMS BATTLE OUT ON THE COURTS

The MSJC men's and women's tennis teams both battled their way through a reduced season with a limited number of available opponents. The women's team took the court five times, while the men played seven matches. Both teams put their best effort forward to combine for a 4-8 record.

In Spring 2022, MSJC will add a new women's sport in beach volleyball, which will compete on a four-court facility at the new Kinesiology and Athletics Complex on the Menifee Valley Campus. Women's indoor volleyball coach Serinna Eason will head the beach team.


COMMUNITY.


JUNETEENTH 2021: MSJC students, faculty and staff celebrated Juneteenth, commemorating the end of slavery in the United States.


BLACK HISTORY MONTH: MSJC celebrated the achievements and contributions of Black and African Americans during multiple events in February.

"We are thrilled to receive these ratings," said Beth Gomez, Vice President of Business Services.




General Fund Unrestricted Revenues and Beginning Fund Balance:

General Fund Unrestricted Expenditures and Ending Fund Balance:




Foundation Fund Revenues and Beginning Fund Balance:
